## New drowning prevention technology to help save lives

Drowning prevention technology is set to help accelerate lifeguard response times at Wanneroo Aquamotion.

The Lynxight system uses artificial intelligence to monitor movement in the water through CCTV cameras, enabling lifeguards to respond more quickly to potential drownings thanks to alerts sent to their smartwatches.

Aquamotion will be the second facility in WA to use the cutting-edge technology to combat blind spots caused by water glare, crowds, water surface disturbance and line of sight issues.

Mayor Linda Aitken said the technology would arm our hardworking lifeguards with new tools to keep pool users safe.

"Last year, Aquamotion attracted 371,000 visits, and with 2024 on track to be even busier, we are always looking for innovations in safety management," she said.

"This technology will be extra eyes in the water at Aquamotion's four pools, helping prevent drowning incidents and reduce the risk of serious injuries.

"It's exciting to take another step forward in our Smart City journey and harness this technology to enhance safety for our community."

Royal Life Saving Australia's General Manager Capability and Industry, RJ Houston, said data from AI-enhanced safety technologies could be applied to elevate existing practices and address challenges, making Australian aquatic facilities safer for everyone.

"While lifeguards play critical prevention and rescue roles, supervision in public swimming pools can be challenging," he said.

"The potential of combining lifeguard expertise with enhanced technological approaches in coming years is exciting."

According to Royal Life Saving Australia, in 2023 there were six drowning deaths, 18 non-fatal drowning incidents and more than 7,800 rescues in public swimming pools across the country.

## New multi-sensory exhibition arrives in Wanneroo

Walking Through a Songline is an immersive digital experience where paintings come to life, stories are visualised and ancient knowledge is shared.

The dramatic multi-sensory installation is based on the National Museum of Australia's internationally acclaimed exhibition, Songlines: Tracking the Seven Sisters.

Songlines map the routes of Ancestral Beings as they travelled across Australia, creating the land and its people.

Walking Through a Songline allows visitors to experience light projections that create representations of songlines, exploring the history of the country, as told by artists, custodians and traditional owners.

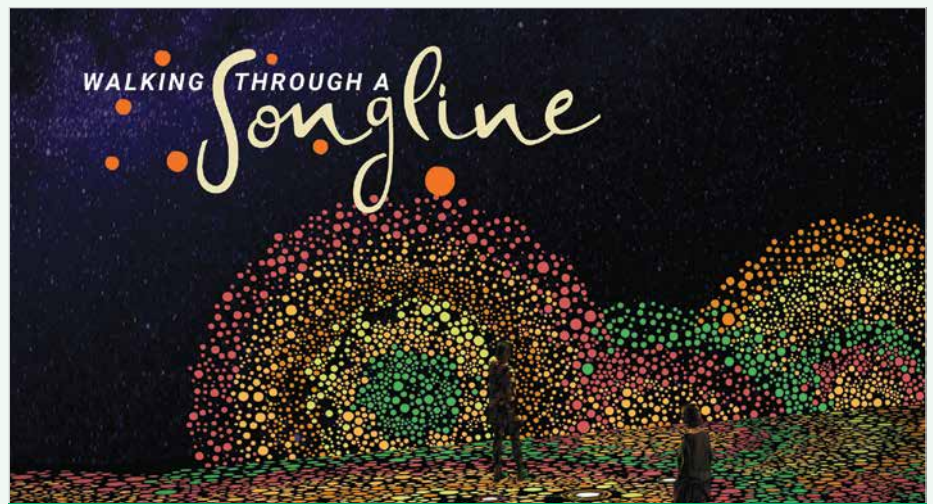

**What is a Place Specialist and what's involved in your day-to-day role?**

As a Place Specialist for Girrawheen/Koondoola, it's my role to build strong relationships with community members and local clubs, groups and organisations to understand the strengths and aspirations of the local area, and to work with them to identify local opportunities and to celebrate the unique vision and qualities of the community.

There are two other Place Specialists at the City who carry out this role in the Wanneroo and Yanchep/Two Rocks areas.

**What does the activation of Girrawheen Hub mean for local people?**

The Hub precinct includes the Girrawheen Library, senior citizens centre and the beautiful community garden, all providing opportunities for people to socialise and learn, which has fostered a strong sense of belonging.

Activation of the Hub means local people in Girrawheen and surrounds can come to the Hub to enjoy workshops, have access to a range of support and other services and engage in creative activities and social opportunities.

There's a diverse range of groups that call Girrawheen Hub home, from our community-led sewing group to several community arts and social groups as well as the Girrawheen Neighbourhood Network, the area's local Town Team.

Whatever event, activity or project is happening at the Hub, it always stems from the needs of the local community.

**Tell us about the Green Girrawheen Sustainability Workshops and how they benefit the community?**

The workshop series was driven by the local community's passion for sustainability.

It provides participants with an avenue to explore better

sustainability practises in their day-to-day lives, as well as a chance to connect with other like-minded community members.

Every household generates waste, and these workshops explore fun ways to minimise that waste by upcycling or repurposing items.

The workshops have been really popular and we hope to be able to deliver more in future!

### DIY body scrub recipe

#### Ingredients

- 1 cup of dried coffee grounds
- 1 cup of raw sugar
- ½ a teaspoon of cinnamon (optional)
- ¾ cup of sweet almond oil or olive oil
- 5-15 drops of essential oils (optional)

#### Method

1. Reuse an old glass jar (eg. jam jar)
2. In your jar, mix all dry ingredients together first
3. Then, add your wet ingredients and combine
4. Your scrub is ready to go.

## Balancing conservation and compliance

Controlling sand drift at construction and development sites is a challenge facing local governments across Australia, but the City of Wanneroo is paving the way to a proactive solution through our dedicated Sand Drift Program, headed up by a dedicated Sand Drift Compliance Officer.

As one of Australia's fastest-growing local governments, the City has seen rapid development in recent years,

making a proactive Sand Drift Inspection Program that meets regulatory requirements and community expectations essential. Currently, there are 54 active land development sites in the City of Wanneroo.

Over the past year, the City's Sand Drift Compliance Officer, Heather, has conducted 385 inspections to ensure developers are adhering to their dust

management plans.

Heather works with a land development engineer, developers and contractors to evaluate mitigation measures, including applying hydro mulch, installing wind mesh barriers, and using water trucks on site.

## Bookable verge collection service

The City's waste team has been busy fulfilling booked bulk collections across the City since changing to the new flexible service in July.

Every residential property paying a waste service fee is eligible to book one of each of the following collections, per financial year:

- bulk hard waste up to 3m<sup>3</sup>
- bulk green waste up to 3m<sup>3</sup>
- mattresses up to 3 items
- white goods up to 4 items
- e-waste up to 6 items.

Book your verge collection online or by calling **9405 5000**.

If you have a booked bulk collection coming up, we've got some tips to help smooth the process!

1. Place your items on your verge up to three days before your booked collection date (we'll send you a booking reminder to help you remember).
2. Place your bulk waste no more than one metre back from the kerb. If you have limited verge space, place items on the side verge or laneway of your property.
3. If you have booked multiple waste types to be picked up in the same week, separate each waste type, as they are collected by different trucks.

This will help ensure you are within the size allowance limits.

## Halesworth Pavilion reaches completion

Construction of the Halesworth Park sporting and recreation precinct is complete, with the delivery of the main pavilion and a separate storage building in August marking the final milestone for this key City project.

In addition to the new \$9.3m pavilion and separate storage building, the precinct boasts two multi-sport ovals, 16 multi-use hardcourts, cricket nets, a dual-use path, children's play area and fitness pod, picnic and barbecue facilities.

The complex is home to a wide range of sports, including rugby, football, soccer, netball, baseball, cricket and athletics.

These buildings will provide local clubs with seven new change rooms, first aid rooms and improved storage.

The new pavilion incorporates two multi-purpose rooms with adjoining servery kitchens, multi-use meeting spaces and public amenities.

Congratulations to the CA Flyers on this incredible achievement!

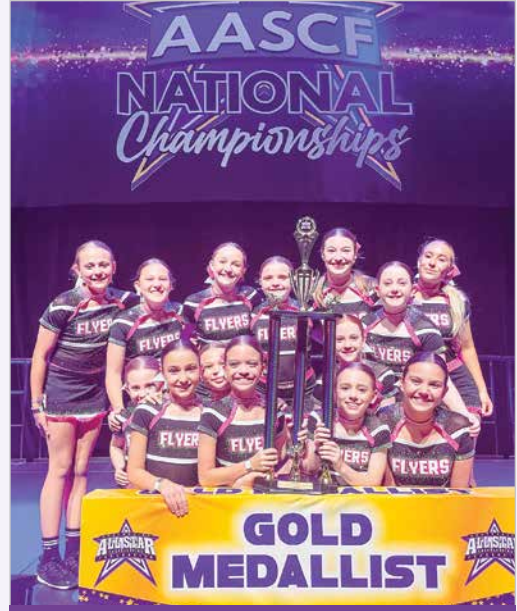
The City's funding program makes it possible for individuals and clubs to participate in state, national and international sporting, art and cultural events. Funding is available for eligible

residents of the City of Wanneroo who are aged 25 and under, 60 and over, or who are living with a disability at any age.

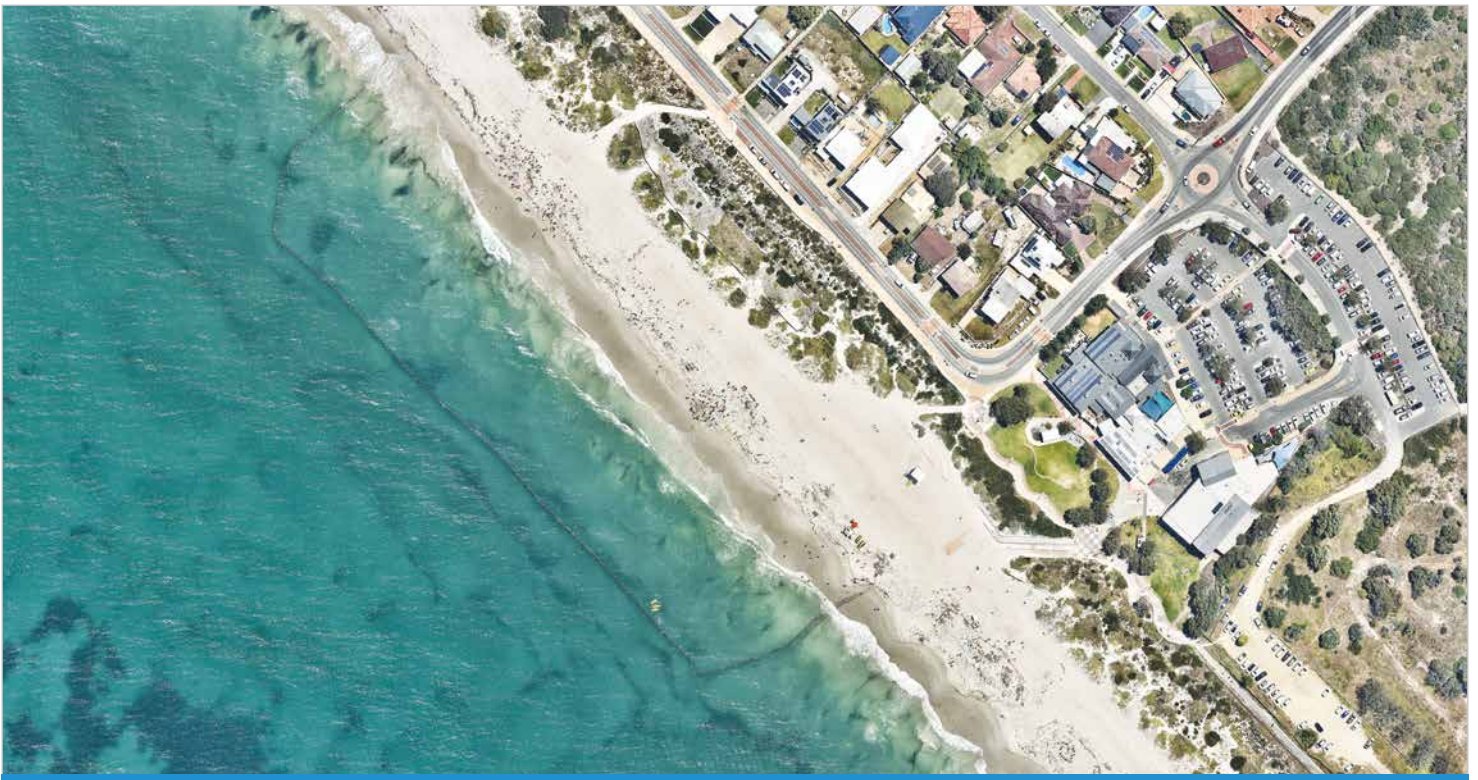

## Stay water safe this summer

As the weather heats up, it's important to be safe at your local beach, pool and at home.

Water safety should be a priority for everyone visiting one of our beautiful local beaches or using pools this summer. It certainly is for us at the City!

We recently reinstalled the Quinns Beach swimming enclosure, to provide peace of mind to beachgoers. Our dedicated Swimming Pool Inspectors conduct inspections of

private properties with pools to ensure compliant and effective safety barriers are in place at homes.

This compliance program is vital, as unsafe and unsupervised backyard swimming pools and spas are the most common location for children to drown in Australia.

Poorly maintained fencing, propped-open gates and lack of self-latching gates all jeopardise pool safety.

This summer, be vigilant and check pool barriers regularly.

### Water safety tips:

- Supervise children in pools and spas at all times
- Learn swimming and lifesaving skills
- Wear a life jacket when boating, rock fishing or paddling
- Swim at patrolled beaches between the red and yellow flags
- Always read safety signs
- If you need help, stay calm and attract attention
- Avoid alcohol and drugs around water.



## Tips for keeping your pets cool this summer

In hot weather, pets can quickly overheat, leading to heatstroke.

If keeping them indoors isn't possible, consider these tips:

- Ensure pets have constant access to fresh water and shade; provide multiple water bowls to prevent dehydration
- Offer a paddling pool for splashing; keep it shaded to keep the water cool
- Do not shave double-coated dog breeds such as Akitas and Golden Retrievers, as their coats naturally insulate against heat.

### Cooling tips for your dog:

- Avoid exercising dogs in extreme heat (above 28 degrees)
- Walk dogs early morning or at night
- Check pavement temperature to prevent paw burns
- Never leave dogs in cars, as temperatures can rise rapidly
- Don't leave dogs in ute trays; hot metal can burn paws
- Offer cool treats like frozen kongs
- Use fans and wet towels if no air conditioning is available
- Watch for heatstroke signs: excessive panting, weakness, drooling, diarrhea, or vomiting



- If heatstroke is suspected, take your dog to the vet immediately and use cool (not ice-cold) water or towels for cooling.



## Beach wheelchair free to hire

Free

We want everyone to be able to enjoy our beaches during the warmer months.

The City's beach wheelchair is available to hire for free from October to April, and allows people with mobility challenges to access Quinns Beach.

The program is supported by Surf Life Saving WA and the Quinns Mindarie Surf Life Saving Club.

## Do your best to stop Perth pest

The City is calling on the community to join the fight against the invasive Polyphagous shot-hole borer (PSHB).

First detected in Perth in 2021, the tiny, wood-boring beetle has been detected in trees across Perth, with a quarantine notice quickly put in place to support the Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development's (DPIRD) response.

The City is working closely with DPIRD to prevent the spread of the PSHB, and encourages the community to use the MyPestGuide app to report suspected sightings.

## Get bushfire ready

With 90 per cent of the City of Wanneroo in a bushfire prone area, it's important all residents are ready for an emergency.

It is critical you have a plan to protect yourself, your loved ones, your animals and your home from storms, bushfires and other natural hazards.

It's been nearly a year since the devastating Mariginiup bushfire, which showed how quickly and easily a bushfire can spread. In just four days, the fire burned through 1,900 hectares and destroyed 18 homes.

The City is proud of the way the community came together to support one another during this time, including staff, residents, businesses, emergency services personnel, volunteers and support services.

While it's easy to think it won't happen to you, bushfires are becoming more frequent and intense, so it is important to be prepared.

# Get to know the *Noongar seasons*

Do you know the six Noongar seasons?

They are Birak, Bunuru, Djeran, Makuru, Djilba and Kambarang.

Noongar seasons are not marked by specific dates but are determined by observing changes in the local environment, including weather patterns, food availability, and changes in flora and fauna.

## **Birak - December to January**

Birak season sees the rains ease up and the warm weather really start to take hold. The afternoons are cooled by the sea breezes from the southwest. This was the fire season, a time to burn the country in mosaic patterns.

## **Bunuru - February to March**

Bunuru is the hottest time of the year with little to no rain. Traditionally this was, and still is, a great time for living and fishing by the coast, rivers and estuaries. Because of this, freshwater foods and seafood made up major parts of the diet during this time of year.

## **Djeran - April to May**

Djeran season at last sees a break in the hot weather, with cool nights bringing morning dew. The winds have also changed, especially in their intensity, with light breezes being the go and generally swinging from southerly directions.

## **Makuru - June to July**

Makuru sees the coldest and wettest time of the year come into full swing. Traditionally, this was a good time to move back inland from the coast as the winds turned to the west and south bringing the cold weather, rains and occasionally snow in high altitude areas.

## **Djilba - August to September**

Djilba season is a transitional time of the year, with some very cold, clear days combining with warmer, wet and windy days and the occasional sunny day or two. This is the start of the massive flowering explosion in the southwest.

## **Kambarang - October to November**

During the Kambarang season longer dry periods accompany a definite warming trend with many things undergoing transformation and an abundance of colours and flowers exploding around us.
